FROM OUR PASTOR

Grace and Peace.

Welcome to May! It's only the 23rd of April, but most of you will be sharing this in early May, so let me be the first to welcome you to it.

This past Sunday marked 1 year of being in the pulpit with you. While it's not what I had signed up for, I can't say I'm surprised. We've all known for a long time how scarce ministers are, and it's something that plagues most all churches in most all denominations. To that point I'd like to bring you up to date on a few things we've learned.

This past Saturday, several of us from St. John attended the joint spring meeting between our Western Association, the Prairie Association, and a few from the Eastern Association. One of the workshops, which was led by Rev. Shernell Edney Stilley, our contact for Search and Call, as well as our Conference Minister, Rev. Molly Carlson, was about search and call, in light of the scarcity of ministers. We all enjoyed their presentation and came away with a few suggestions that both our Search Committee and the wider church should be aware of. I'll do my best to highlight a few things.

- A point was made that it will most likely be necessary to think outside the box as we look at our next call. Their point was, that while most churches used to receive several candidates to choose from, that's no longer the case. For this reason, it's important to make sure churches are meeting the needs of their next minister.
- Additionally, the point was made that there
 will certainly be more semi-retired, bivocational, and/or part-time candidates in
 the pool. This is not only due to the size of
 the pool to choose from, but also the fact
 that more and more churches can only
 afford part-time ministry.

- One suggestion of the panel was to be proactive in helping a new minister find that second income which may be a factor in their acceptance of a call. It was understood that most churches have community leaders within their congregations or have other business contacts throughout their communities. Using these resources to help a new minister with additional income might very well be a key to helping them make their lives whole.
 - It's important to note within this, that if the next minister is indeed bivocational or part-time, that church members will need to respect that they will not always be in the church office.
- Something I found very interesting was the mention of 'mental health' days. The pair suggested that it's becoming more and more important for congregation members to fill the pulpit from time to time to ease the weekly preparation stress for the pastor. As they mentioned this, I couldn't help but think of several churches where I know this is taking place.
- Parsonages were not really discussed at length, but I have had other conversations both within and outside of the church. In several cases, it seems like churches calling part-time ministers are finding that they might already have homes in an adjacent community. For this and any other reason, it's important for churches to explore the option of renting their parsonage to offset the living expenses that will be part of the new pastor's contract.
- Something that also caught our interest was
 the suggestion that churches need to be
 thinking about raising up new ministers
 from within their congregations. A
 gentleman sitting next to me at the time
 was exactly that, and had ministered to his
 church for the past 7 years, after the
 congregation asked him to do so. He has
 been taking online classes and workshops

when he can attend, with the church making sure the fees are covered and the time away is allowed.

- Calling the right person was also mentioned. The point they were making, was to make sure that the person they called fit the congregation and could minister to their needs, but could also be a representative part of the community. Someone who could minister to the congregation, but not be accepted within the community, might not find living there to be very fulfilling.
- Expectations must also be real. I think this is an important piece. As I mentioned above, if a part-time minister is called, they must be allowed to be part-time. This might well be due to a semi-retired person needing their grandchildren time, (me!) or in some cases to earn outside income.
 - Another expectation area is the desire of so many congregations that the new minister be able to 'grow the church'. This is a fallacy in most communities and has no place in the search and call conversation. This may or may not happen for many reasons, but it should not be a goal of the next pastorate.
 - Further in this, congregations need to be the ministers for the community and spreading the Good News of the Gospel and of their church. St. John does this very well and I'm very proud of your community involvement, which should be shared during your interview conversations.
 - The pastor of a church should also not be expected to 'run the church'. I relate this story – I was sitting in the office of a mentor many years ago, and we heard a fair amount of noise in the adjacent fellowship hall. When we went to the door we saw several gentlemen pushing a piano out so they could load it onto a truck. When I asked the pastor what they were

doing, he promptly replied that he didn't know, and that property wasn't his responsibility.

Now as you might imagine, this list from our meeting, as well as other conversations I've had, is by no means complete. The point from the host's and myself, is that the next minister arrangement may not be of the 'cookie cutter' type. The more flexible the church is in meeting the needs of the next pastor, the more candidates you will attract. St. John has so very much to offer, and we have been warmly welcomed, but as our hosts on Saturday made the point, whoever the next minister is, will need to be part of the community. If we lived closer, that's a discussion we could have, but that's simply not the case, and not the call God has placed on our relationship.

Please take some time to consider these thoughts and begin imagining what your next ministerial relationship might look like.



MEET OUR NEW MEMBERS

On Sunday, April 7th during the morning worship service we took in 3 new members: Rev. Dan and Nancy Dexter and Hannah Meece.

REV. DAN AND NANCY DEXTER



We at St. John UCC have two new members familiar from their visits here as supply pastor and wife. In this capacity, the Rev. Dan and Nancy Dexter have joined us off and on for over a decade.

Dan grew up in Springfield. His mother Jacqueline remarried when he was four to James Shepherd. The family attended First United Methodist Church, which had 3,300 members. He says it was not very personal. Since his early teens, Dan has enjoyed working on electronics, especially vintage Hi Fi equipment. He graduated from Illinois Wesleyan University with a major in political science and minors in business and insurance. For twelve years he worked as a financial and administrative manager, living in five cities, from Boise to Albany.

Then Dan's life took a turn. "What made me decide to go to seminary and into ministry," he says, "is truly known only to God as I'm still scratching my head after more than 45 years." He graduated from Oral Roberts Graduate School of Theology in Tulsa. His diverse credentials also include four units (years) of clinical education in Psychosocial Care from SIU Medical School and Chaplain Residency, also through SIU at Memorial Center in Springfield. Pastor Dan has served United Methodist churches in Buffalo/Mechanicsburg and Mt. Sterling, where

he met Nancy. Then he took another turn and switched to the United Church of Christ. In our denomination he has served churches in Minier; Lake Geneva, WI; Tripoli, IA; and First Congregational UCC in Springfield. He has also worked as a staff chaplain at both St. John and Memorial hospitals for many years.

Dan's daughter Amy from his first marriage lives in Springfield and works for the state. Her son John lives in Minnesota and her mother in Florida.

Nancy grew up in Mt. Sterling in Brown County. There her family consisted of her parents Clinton and Maye Barker and her brother Ronnie. She says she grew up in the Baptist Church until she was old enough to make up her own mind, and then she joined the Methodist Church. She is trained as a Licensed Practical Nurse and worked for many years at nursing homes in Quincy, Jacksonville, and Springfield. Dan and Nancy were married June 11, 1988. Nancy says the adjustment for her was learning to be herself and not "the minister's wife."

Now there's a new adjustment for both the Dexters as they have joined the St. John family. Nancy says she was proud of Dan when he was in the pulpit because she knows he loved the churches he served, but she is very happy to have him beside her in worship now. He says he feels just fine sitting in the pew after holding the reins for so long. These new members say they have felt welcomed and cared for since they first attended St. John – more than ten years ago. And we are delighted to have them with us on our journey. HANNAH MEECE

New member Hannah Meece is no stranger to St. John UCC. She was baptized here by the Rev. Rich Reinwald, who also confirmed her and officiated at her wedding. The Church received the following letter from the Regional Housing and Supportive Services, Inc. The Church Council decided to include it in the May Newsletter.



April 2024

Dear Congregation,

We know that people in our community often look to you for assistance. The Board of Regional Housing & Supportive Services (RHSS) want to make you aware of an exciting new project in Logan County.

RHSS was created to oversee the task of converting the former St. Clara's Nursing Home building into a functional space for the community. This project was made possible through the donation of the building from Lincoln College.

Our vision is that this building, now known as *Hope on* 5th, will be a future home to veterans, families, and individuals, who are homeless or at risk of homelessness, and as a location to provide services that will assist any community member with transition to a better life.

To date, work is being completed to get the building operational, including updates to plumbing, electrical, and HVAC and restoration of the large kitchen.

This work has been supported financially to date by a donation from Logan County Board, a grant from the Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs, and various donations from community individuals and organizations, including the Woods Foundation and Ameren.

Space is currently being leased in the building by Land of Lincoln Group, for hosting local AA and NA meetings. The Land of Lincoln Legal Aid is now providing legal services using an office in the building. Talks with other organizations and service providers are also in the works currently about how to best use available space.



How can you help us create this resource for Lincoln and Logan County and provide hope for those in need in Logan County?

Financial support is needed to continue the work to make this dream a reality.

Volunteers are needed to help do the work and ideas for services and support are needed.
