FROM OUR PASTOR

I'm curious, do you ever bite your tongue? I do, and it's been happening more of late. I think it's been for 5 or 6 months or so. Does it hurt? Well maybe some, but I sure feel better for it.

You see I'm not talking about actually biting the tongue in my mouth, I'm talking about biting the words that come out of my thoughts and mouth. We've all heard the expression; I wish I would have bitten my tongue instead of saying that. Or what mom always told us; if you can't say something nice, don't say anything at all. Ok, maybe your mom didn't say that, but mine did, and sometimes rather regularly.

Now let's be honest, every one of us have caught ourselves saying things out of anger, frustration, or just to be heard. Sometimes we don't even know what the topic or conversation is, but by golly we have to have a word in it! These are places where we need to bite our tongue, and maybe mind our own business. I preached some of this a couple of weeks ago, referring to some of the time I spent on conference and association boards, and the stories we would hear about troubled churches. Most of the time, it was just as I said above, that people need to learn when to speak, because what they have to say needs to be heard, and when to keep their thoughts and actions to themselves. I saw this in my last church, where one party said something a bit snide to another, and then the injured party never came back. Feelings matter, and they are more fragile than we often understand.

So, you ask, what does God's Word have to say about this? Well, I'm glad you asked, because God says plenty, and much of it He wrote in the book of Proverbs. Here are a few:

Proverbs 16:23 - The hearts of the wise make their mouths prudent, and their lips promote instruction.

Proverbs 18:6-7 - The lips of fools bring them strife, and their mouths invite a beating. The mouths of fools are their undoing, and their lips are a snare to their very lives

Proverbs 19:1 - Better the poor whose walk is blameless than a fool whose lips are perverse.

Proverbs 23:15-16 - ¹⁵ My son, if your heart is wise, then my heart will be glad indeed; ¹⁶ my inmost being will rejoice when your lips speak what is right.

Proverbs 10:20-21- The tongue of the righteous is choice silver, but the heart of the wicked is of little value. The lips of the righteous nourish many, but fools die for lack of sense.

Proverbs 10:31-32 - ³¹ The mouth of the righteous flows with wisdom, But the perverted tongue will be cut out. ³² The lips of the righteous bring forth what is acceptable, But the mouth of the wicked what is perverted.

Proverbs 11:11 - Through the blessing of the upright a city is exalted, but by the mouth of the wicked it is destroyed.

I think from these few verses that you get my point, and it goes hand in hand with my message that day. As I said at that time, St. John is in a time of transition as the congregation prepares for its next minister. I preached a while back about what God's word says about being more forgiving. I followed that a few weeks later with how to best deal with conflict. And just a couple of weeks ago my message was, for lack of a better description, how to keep the peace, by not bickering, especially about pointless things. Nothing, as I mentioned that day, will divide a congregation and create more long-term hurt, than simply saying things we shouldn't. Sometimes it's best to simply bite our tongue when we don't approve of another's actions.


What I hope we've understood in each of these messages, is that God's Word say's plenty about

dealing with conflict and being more forgiving. And as I've noted above, God also has plenty to say about an unkept tongue. And conversely, God also has much to say about showing kindness and compassion, by maybe biting our tongues a bit more.

Yes, St. John is in a time of transition, and there's nothing I want more, than for your next minister to be loved in the same manner with which you have loved us. And equally, my prayer is that your next minister will fill your pulpit with the kindness, love and compassion you so richly deserve. Your search committee has taken their task to heart, and done a wonderful job of vetting the profiles they've received. Please thank them and let them know how much you appreciate them for their effort and sacrifice. It's not an easy task, but they have been service-minded and deserve all the support you can offer.

So, how about spending a bit more time contemplating God's word, and then trying to live into it. You see, God knew us before we were born, and he knew we would need prodding from time to time on how to get along with the rest of His children. And much like a mother, God will instruct us on when we should bite our tongues, and when we should speak, doing so with the same love and compassion that Jesus speaks with, as he teaches the flocks that He shepherds.


